Faculty will also have access to the aligned assessments and learning activities. I will also create a series of professional development videos associated with the resources. Sabbatical Leave Proposal Fall 2023 Professor of Music Kimberly C. Harris, Ph.D.

A. Rationale and Plan:

Evidence-based practices demonstrate that course design, rather than content, rules as "king" of instruction. When course design aligns all aspects of instruction with Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs), the resulting framework benefits students by allowing them to demonstrate mastery through a scaffolding of assessments and learning activities (McTighe and Wiggins, 2012). Studies have shown that students are more invested in a course when students help create parts of the criteria by which they will be assessed. Creating assessments, rubrics, and learning activities based on SLOs is fundamental to teaching and learning. As co-creators, students benefit through the teamwork, communication skills, and critical thinking required to establish the product; they gain a clearer understanding of expectations for assessments and assignments; and they cultivate a deeper connection to the course SLOs. According to recent literature, textbook costs are rising at a rate four times that of inflation and approximately only 30% of students purchase required course textbooks (Hilton, 2016). Currently, no resources exist that are both free for the Collin College Music Appreciation students that also align with the Collin College and State of Texas required SLOs including the Core Objectives: Teamwork, Communication Skills, Critical Thinking, and Social Responsibility.

My sabbatical plan is to create a Music Appreciation Open Education Resource specifically aligned to the SLOs required by Collin College and the State of Texas for the MUSI1306 Music Appreciation Core classes. Sets of clear and measurable unit level learning objectives with assessments and corresponding rubrics (including a set that can be partially codeveloped with students) will be created using the backward design method. A set of learning activities that align with the assessments will also be created. Any faculty teaching the Music Appreciation courses will have the option to offer students this free resource that aligns with the required SLOs. Faculty will also have access to the aligned assessments and learning activities. The resource will be designed so that faculty can choose to teach chronologically or by genre, an option currently not available. I will also create a series of professional development videos that teach faculty the benefits of 1) using their learning outcomes as part of the backward course design process, 2) creating rubrics and assessments that increase the transparency and effectiveness of their instruction 3) incorporating all of this effectively in Canvas. The deliverables from this sabbatical will increase student access, reduce student costs, and improve assessment of the SLOS for the MUSI1306 course. I have wanted to do this for some time. I have started with a few OER resources; however, I have not had the necessary time needed to create an entire OER text that aligns on all levels with the SLOs. Thank you for your consideration.
