ARTS/ART HISTORY

History of American Art Part 3: The Civil War (Online)

This course covers American art from 1860 to 1865. Topics will include photography, painting and prints made during the Civil War. We will also consider slave art, POW art, and Civil War monuments.

Dr. Claire Robertson earned her B.A. from The University of Texas Arlington, her M.A. from Texas Christian University, and a Ph.D. from University of Kansas in art history. She specializes in the 19th-century American art, Italian Renaissance art, and 19th-century French painting. Dr. Robertson wrote her dissertation on portraitist Thomas Hicks and celebrity culture in mid-19th century New York. When not wandering about museums or studying art, Dr. Robertson enjoys hanging out with her two cow dogs, Hank and Charlie, who are named after country music legends Hank Williams and Charlie Daniels.

The Baroque style can be described as gorgeous, dramatic and emotional.

The author, with substantial research, explains how the pendulum swung against the Golden Era & discusses possibilities about a return to the dream.

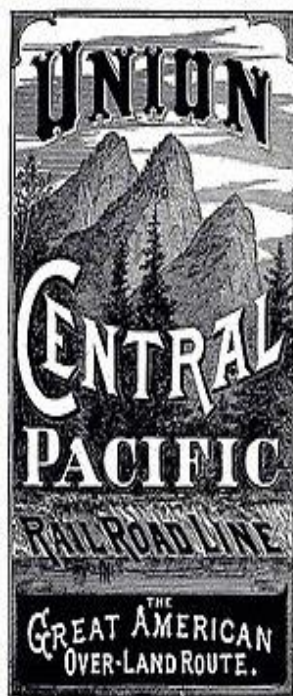

Both victories and defeats were known to her, but she and her husband prevailed and shortly after her death Italian independence was achieved. She is acknowledged as the mother of the Italian Revolution.

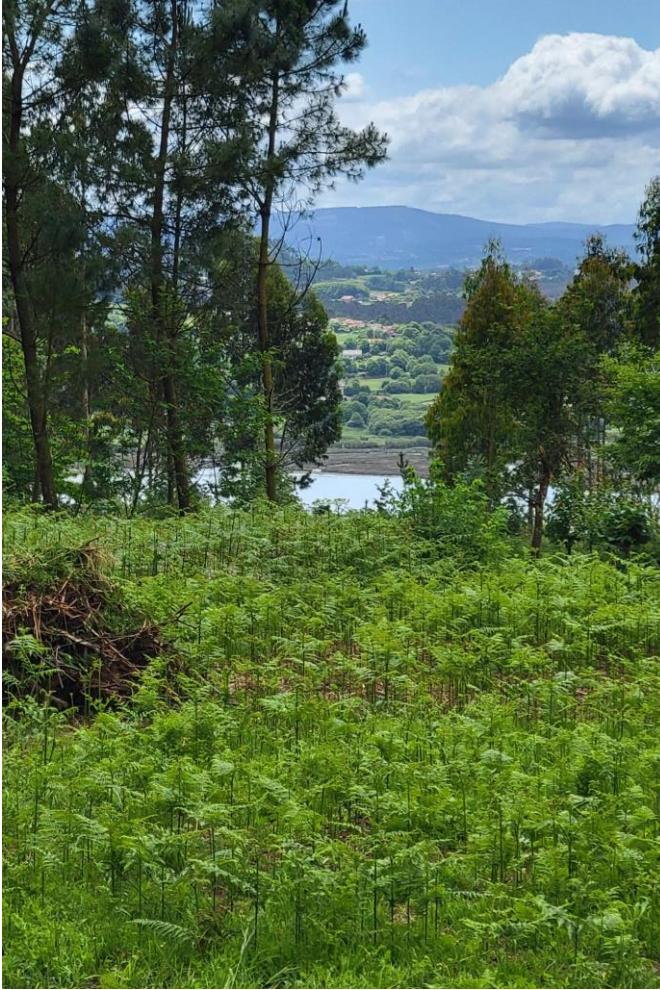

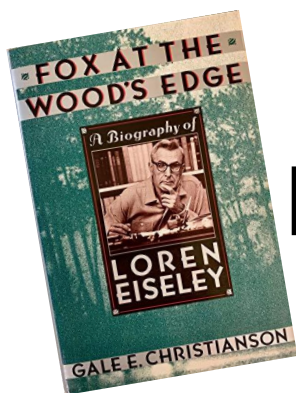

INTRODUCTION TO WATERCOLOR (Rani Velma)

Supplies:

1. Watercolor paints (choose a basic set of primary colors or bring what you already have)
2. Watercolor paper (cold press, 140lb or 300gsm) 9”x12” is good size
(or purchase sheets from the instructor **(\$2.00 per sheet)**)
3. Watercolor brushes (natural or synthetic, round and flat)
4. Water container (art classroom has several for students to use!)
5. Palette or mixing tray
6. Pencil and eraser
7. Masking fluid (optional)
8. Spray bottle (for creating texture and blending)

Understanding Watercolor

1. Overview of watercolor painting
2. Introduction to materials: watercolor paints, brushes, paper
3. Explanation of watercolor techniques: wet-on-wet, wet-on-dry
4. Demonstration of basic brushstrokes

Color Theory and Mixing

1. Basic color theory: primary, secondary, and tertiary colors
2. Mixing colors: how to create a color chart
3. Demonstration of color mixing techniques
4. Practice mixing colors and creating gradients

Day 2: Foundations of Watercolor Painting

Basic Techniques

1. Review of previous day's techniques
2. Introduction to wash techniques: flat wash, graded wash, and variegated wash
3. Demonstration of various brush techniques: dry brushing, splattering, lifting
4. Practice exercises to master brush control

1. Importance of composition in watercolor painting
2. Basic principles of composition: rule of thirds, leading lines, focal point
3. Sketching techniques: using pencil or light watercolor pencil

1. Explanation of layering and glazing techniques
2. Demonstration of layering colors to create depth
3. Practice exercises on layering and glazing

Creating Textures

1. Introduction to creating textures with watercolor
2. Demonstration of techniques for creating texture: salt, alcohol, plastic wrap, etc
3. Practice creating textures on sample paintings

Day 4: Final Projects and Critique

Final Project

1. Review of techniques learned so far
2. Selection of a final project: landscape, still life, or portrait
3. Demonstration of planning and executing a final project
4. Critique of final projects: positive feedback and constructive criticism
5. Tips for continuing to improve in watercolor painting
